I would offer that the way to navigate these rapidly and radically CHANGING times is to hold on to that which does not change...that which is CHANGELESS. Is there such a thing? Yes. In the New Testament book of James we read: "Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like the shifting shadows." God loves you when you feel confident useful and strong AND when you feel anxious, useless and week.

God loved you in your crib and God will love you on your death bed.

Through the prophet Jeremiah, God said to his people: "Yes, I have loved you with an everlasting love." (Jer. 31:3) I love those words! Can you hear your Loving Lord saying them to you? I invite you to slow down, take a deep breath and allow the Spirit of God to press those words into your soul and help you hear them afresh.

It was Elisabeth Elliot who would say, during each radio broadcast, "You are loved with an everlasting love. And underneath are the everlasting arms." May we live together, in these days of uncertainty and change, in the knowledge of that bracing and changeless truth.
