A Plea For Mercy!

A mother once approached Napoleon seeking a pardon for her son. The emperor replied that the young man had committed a certain offense twice, and justice demanded death. "But I don't ask for justice," the mother explained. "I plead for *mercy*." "But your son does not deserve *mercy*," Napoleon replied. "Sir," the woman cried, "it would not be *mercy* if he deserved it, and *mercy* is all I ask for." "Well, then," the emperor said, "I will have *mercy*," and he spared the woman's son!

Thank goodness that mother knew the difference between justice and mercy! And equally important was Napolean's willingness to be merciful!

The Bible makes the difference clear as well...

Justice is getting what you deserve, Mercy is not getting what you deserve!

Scripture says, 'all have sinned and fall short of God's glory...and the wages of sin is death. (Rom. 3:23; 6:23) those who do not believe in Jesus Christ are 'condemned already' (John 3:18) That is the justice we all deserve.

Yet, those who believe in Jesus Christ and His loving grace and mercy are no longer condemned! (John 3:18) Jesus' death on the Cross paid for our just punishment and delivered us from our just condemnation! Romans 8:1 confidently states; 'There is therefore now no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus!'

And it's all because of God's great love & rich mercy! Eph. 4:4-5 states it plainly; 'But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, ⁵ even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—'

In a greater way than Napolean, God has chosen to show us His mercy rather than His justice through Jesus Christ's saving death and atonement for our sin!

This is The Message of Good Friday and Easter!

If need be, call out to The Lord today and say...'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' Ask for His mercy to save you from your just condemnation and receive His loving grace and mercy through Jesus Christ! (Luke 18:13; Rom.10:13)

And for those of us who have, His mercies continue to be poured out on us, undeserving sinners every day! Lam. 3:22-24 says;

'The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; ²³ they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness. "The Lord is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him."'

This passage forms the foundation of the hymn, 'Great is Thy Faithfulness' which reminds us of God's enduring mercy, it says;

Great is Thy faithfulness, Great is Thy faithfulness Morning by morning new mercies I see, All I have needed Thy hand hath provided Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!

In the Garden

Mary Magdalene went and said to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord..." (John 20:18)

On a gently winding path shaded by olive branches, a woman in white, with head bowed and hand clasping her throat as if to choke back her sobs, walked slowly into the shadows. It was Mary. As she came to the tomb, upon which she placed her hand, she bent over to look in and then hurried away. John, in flowing robe, appeared. Then came Peter, who entered the tomb, followed slowly by John. As they departed, Mary reappeared, leaning her head upon the tomb as she wept. Turning, she saw the Jesus standing in front of her. She knelt before him, with arms outstretched and looking into His face, she cried "Rabboni!" (This means Teacher).

It was this garden scene that inspired Austin Miles, in 1912, to write "In the Garden," one of the most beloved hymns ever written. The words of the song tell the story: "I come to the garden alone, while the dew is still on the roses. And the voice I hear, falling on my ear, the Son of God discloses. And He walks with me, and He talks with me, and He tells me I am His own. And the joy we share, as we tarry there, none other has ever known." May these words, "He tells me I am His own," echo in your heart as you draw close to the Lord this Lenten season.

A Tradition Takes Root

The last Friday in April is celebrated as Arbor Day in the United States, but the tradition of planting trees first evolved in Spain. In the village Villanueva de la Sierra, a priest named Ramón Vacas Roxo was convinced that trees were not only beautiful and important to the environment but also improved health and hygiene. In 1805, he began a tradition of planting trees during a threeday festival. He even wrote a manifesto explaining the importance of trees and delivered it to neighboring villages, encouraging residents to plant their own. It wasn't until April 10, 1872, that J. Sterling Morton—a newspaper editor turned politician—founded Arbor Day as an official holiday

in Nebraska. In 1883, educator Birdsey Northrop of Connecticut traveled to Japan, where he spread the idea of an Arbor Day holiday. That message, and the countless millions of trees planted since, lives on this April 25, 2025.
